Sailing Matters!

Capsizing is not mandatory, but it helps to cool you down! Launching boats while wearing water-friendly sandals is wonderfully soothing on the feet! Hats, suncream, sunglasses and drinks help to keep you safe and hydrated! Come on down and enjoy the fabulous sailing \odot .

On Wednesday evening we held the final of the Summer series of races. Although the lake was mirror-like when we launched, surprisingly the wind did appear and we had a lovely race on a smallish course which included two beats so plenty of opportunity for overtaking. Pete D and Ken took the honors in the handicap and solos fleets respectively. For the series' overall, the medal positions in the solo fleet were Ken, Bruce and Roger Allan; the handicap fleet results still need to be consolidated to take account of people sailing different boats or using different rigs in different races throughout the series. A quick scan of the results suggests Pete D won the handicap fleet, with Mike in second and possibly me third \odot . However, these results are yet to be verified by our results maestro, Sue.

Last Sunday we held our first Team Racing event for many years. Overall, 12 boats took part in 3 teams: lasers, bytes and a handicap fleet. We had a right laugh! OK, so the wind was light and changeable, but that added to the fun. Mike did worry about how on earth he would tame his normal instinct to try to ruin Pete R's start or cover him up the beats, but he seemed to cope ok. Sue had magnificent starts on three out of the four starts which was not easy due to the vastly fluctuating wind direction & strength. Laurie in his mirror had a fabulous first beat on the first race staying up with the lasers & bytes – all the way until the last 50m which went slightly haywire. John Rosser did a sterling job of managing four shortish races of approximately 30 minutes each. In the end, it wasn't close – the bytes won by a country mile! We all definitely want to do something like this again next year. Maybe in class teams; maybe in mixed class team with mixed ability in each class. Watch this space.

Back in mid-July, we held the club championship races for the Rosamunde Trophy. Rosamunde has quite a history at Frampton on Severn, and the green is named after her. Coming up we have the Junior and Rookie races Sunday 14th (tomorrow as I write this) and 21st July, followed by the personal handicap pursuit races. I've now worked out how to calculate the handicaps so that the slower boats don't have to race for 90 minutes and the faster boats only 40 minutes. The slower boats get a few free laps to start with! On Wednesday Evening we start the Gold/Silver series. Everyone is assigned to either the Gold or Silver fleet for the series, depending on their racing history. Gold fleet sets off first followed 2 minutes later by the silver fleet. Both are normal handicap races. This gives those who usually finish mid/lower down the rankings the opportunity to race for prizes! The Sir Peter Scott Club Championship day is the first Sunday in September. I'm sure it will be

mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter, but in case you did not know, there is no club racing on Sunday 11^{th} September as it is Frampton Show day. If you are free that day, please offer to help at the show – it's an amazing event and we always have keen interest in the club which generates new members which keeps the club thriving \bigcirc .

The observant among you will notice that I have not mentioned weed so far. It did seem to have a massive growth spurt just before junior week, but the recent cut seems to have done the job nicely and the amount of weed on the surface has visibly reduced from Wednesday 10 days ago, to last Sunday to Wednesday just gone. Future Dinghy Instructors (DI)

In order to continue to be able to provide the high standard of RYA sailing courses at Frampton SC, the Club is now seeking additional Dinghy Instructors (DIs) to enable the Club to maintain the standard and number of courses currently available.

It will be expected that the newly qualified DIs join the current pool of instructors and undertake to support the training courses during the year.

The club will support suitable candidates with training to achieve the **entry requirements** for an instructor are as follows:

Minimum age 16

Required certificates: First Aid Certificate
RYA Powerboat level 2

Experience: Experienced sailor capable of sailing in strong winds.

Competence: Sail a triangular course in a 2 person boat.

Sail a tight circular course around a stationary boat making only one tack and one gybe.

Pick up a man overboard dummy, the boat to be stopped and more than one attempt should

not be needed.

Sail without a rudder.

Lee shore landing and departure.

Pick up a mooring.

Come alongside a moored boat.

Recover a capsized dinghy.

Training Course:

Normally about 50 hrs, held over a number of weekends. Course will not necessarily be held at Frampton.

On completion of the course candidates will be required to demonstrate competence in course preparation, delivery and management as well as customer liaison.
